

Units Needing Separate Analysis




- Areas to Analyze Separately
 - Munger (own 27% of total acres)
 - Shingle Creek Project Area in Orange County
 - Most were donated to SFWMD by Orange County
 - Bird Drive (own 22% of total acres)
 - Everglades National Park Seepage Management
 Project in Miami-Dade County
 - Additional parcels owned by TIITF and Miami-Dade County
 - Pal-Mar (own 36% of total acres)
 - Approximately 1900 parcels
 - Most are jointly owned with Martin County





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Assessment Challenges



- Find alternative uses where possible
- More public, stakeholder and staff outreach needed
- Non-contiguous ownership
 - Creates land management challenges
 - Generally unable to restore hydrology
- Complex legal issues inhibit some use options
