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## SFWMD Issues a Burn Ban on Public Lands

Campfires and other open burning are prohibited due to dry conditions

West Palm Beach, FL — In an effort to protect lives, property and the environment amid severe drought conditions that have increased wildfire danger, the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) today issued an emergency order that prohibits the public from building fires on District lands open for recreation.

The ban means no fires in grills, fireplaces or fire rings provided by the District or other authorized management agencies until further notice. The cautious use of portable camp stoves and grills, brought in by users for cooking purposes only, is allowed.

Since January 1, at least 1,570 wildfires have burned 43,565 acres in Florida, more than twice last year's number of fires and acres burned to date in 2008. Most of these fires were caused by human carelessness, the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services reported on Thursday.

Along with the burn ban, the SFWMD is asking residents and businesses to conserve water and follow landscape irrigation restrictions to stretch and protect the public supply.
