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SFWMD Supporting Federal Bill to Ban Importation of Exotic Pythons District deputy executive director to testify before U.S. House subcommittee on Friday

WHAT:

The South Florida Water Management District's (SFWMD) Deputy Executive Director of Operations and Maintenance, George Horne, will testify Friday before a United States House of Representatives subcommittee in support of a bill (H.R. 2811) to ban the importation of non-native pythons.

Sponsored by U.S. Rep. Kendrick Meek and co-sponsored by U.S. Rep. Tom Rooney, H.R. 2811 would classify Burmese, African rock and other pythons that have invaded America's Everglades as "injurious animals." As a top predator and prolific breeder, these exotic snakes threaten state and federal restoration efforts and prey on the natural wildlife that call the Everglades home, including species already threatened or endangered.

Since 2000, the District and Everglades National Park have removed 1,248 Burmese pythons from the Everglades. According to the U.S. Geological Survey, Burmese python population estimates range from 5,000 to more than 100,000 in the Everglades.
