Student Art Projects Designed to Save Water

Judges will pick one of eight decorated rain barrels for use at SFWMD Lower West Coast Service Center

WHAT:

Student art projects, sponsored by the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD), are about to become water conservation features at middle and high schools throughout southern Lee County and at the District's Lower West Coast Service Center.

A panel of five judges, including SFWMD Governing Board member Charles Dauray, will meet Tuesday to select one of the eight student-decorated rain barrels for installation at the service center. Art students painted each of the barrels with images of plants, animals and landscapes that represented the theme of *The South Florida Environment*. The remaining barrels will be returned to the schools where they were designed for use in their landscaping.

All eight rain barrels are currently on display at the SFWMD Lower West Coast Service Center.

BACKGROUND: Rain barrels collect and store rainwater that falls on roofs for later

use, such as watering plants. The water-saving containers reduce the amount of water needed for landscape irrigation, which accounts for as much as half of the 179 gallons of water used per person per day in South Florida. In addition, rain barrels help prevent stormwater runoff that can affect water quality in rivers, creeks, estuaries and

other waterways.
