**Celebrate the Everglades at 11<sup>th</sup> Annual Everglades Day Festival** SFWMD to give tours of Everglades living laboratory throughout the event

WHAT: Bring the family to celebrate the natural beauty of the Everglades at the 11<sup>th</sup> annual Everglades Day Festival, hosted by the Arthur R. Marshall Loxahatchee National Wildlife Refuge. The South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) will be among more than 30 exhibitors from local clubs, nonprofit organizations and agencies attending the event.

The District, in association with the Audubon Society of the Everglades, will be providing guided tours of the Everglades living laboratory known as the Loxahatchee Impoundment Landscape Assessment (LILA). LILA is a working 80-acre model of the Everglades ecosystem on the grounds of the Refuge that gives experts an opportunity to research and apply restoration techniques on a small, controlled scale.

Organized around the theme of "Arts in the Everglades," this year's Everglades Day Festival will feature a wide variety of art, from paintings and photography to musical and dance performances. Renowned photographer Clyde Butcher, the event's special guest speaker, will deliver a presentation on the Everglades and photography.

Other activities at the day-long festival include wildlife presentations, canoeing, kayaking, fishing demonstrations and educational programs.
