High School Students Learning, Building Legacy at DuPuis New SFWMD education program gives students hands-on experience on public lands

WHAT:

Students from Clark Advanced Learning Center will hike among the pine flatwoods of DuPuis Management Area and collect plant data to help the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) kick off a new hands-on environmental education program.

Known as Legacy, the program connects water resource and environmental education with land management activities. Legacy partners local high schools with public lands managed by the District to provide outdoor learning experiences for teachers and students.

The 22,000-acre DuPuis Management Area in western Martin County is one of four sites around the 16-county District that will be part of the program in 2010-2011. The multi-use natural area is interspersed with numerous ponds, wet prairies, cypress domes, pine flatwoods and remnant Everglades marsh.
