### **SFWMD Plans Prescribed Burn Today at DuPuis**

*Smoke may be visible from the site on the Martin/Palm Beach county line*

**West Palm Beach, FL** – The South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) plans to conduct a prescribed burn today in the DuPuis Management Area to reduce wildfire danger and benefit the ecology of the area.

Crews are conducting the approximately 4,355-acre burn in a remote portion of the 22,000-acre natural area to reduce excessive ground cover that can fuel large wildfires. This action also improves habitat for wildlife. The scheduled burn is part of a regular prescribed burn program at DuPuis and is scheduled to be complete by the end of the day.

Prescribed fire is one of the most ecologically important and cost-effective tools for land management in Florida, providing numerous benefits to people, wildlife and the environment. Fire ecology studies have shown that many wildlife species, including deer, turkey and many rare mammals, birds and reptiles, use habitats with fire-dependent plant communities that require periodic burning to maintain their productivity.

Prescribed fire benefits include:

- Reducing wildfire danger
- Controlling exotic vegetation
- Improving wildlife habitat and plant diversity
- Maintaining fire-dependent plant communities

In an average year, the Florida Forest Service issues about 120,000 prescribed burning authorizations statewide for about 2 million acres of land. The District manages close to 1 million acres of land subject to natural and prescribed fires.
