'Mysteries of the Everglades' on Display at Everglades Day Festival Public can tour SFWMD's living Everglades lab

WHAT: As part of the 13th Annual Everglades Day Festival, there will be walking tours of the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD)
Everglades living laboratory known as the Loxahatchee Impoundment Landscape Assessment (LILA).

LILA is a working 80-acre model of the Everglades ecosystem on the grounds of the Arthur R. Marshall Loxahatchee National Wildlife Refuge, which is hosting the event. LILA provides scientists and water managers an opportunity to research and apply restoration techniques on a small, controlled scale before implementation in the South Florida environment.

The theme of the event is "Mysteries of the Everglades." Visitors can participate in nature walks, entertainment, wildlife presentations, canoeing and other environmental activities.

As a prelude to the event, the Refuge will host a trail improvement day on February 4, from 9 a.m. to noon. Volunteers will pick up trash, remove non-native plants and clear trails to prepare for Everglades Day.
