The public is invited to the 10th Annual CREW Wildflower Festival to enjoy a kaleidoscope of colorful wildflowers and learn about the valuable role that the Corkscrew Regional Ecosystem Watershed (CREW) fills in protecting Southwest Florida's water supply.

The South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) and its partners — representing businesses, environmental groups, landowners and governmental agencies — manage the watershed for its numerous benefits to water storage, wildlife preservation and public recreation opportunities. The 60,000-acre watershed spanning Lee and Collier counties includes a majestic 5,000-acre marsh at its headwaters and the famous Audubon Corkscrew Swamp Sanctuary.

As the CREW Trust celebrates more than 20 years of preservation and education, festival visitors will be treated to an array of activities, including a slide show by local authors and wildflower experts and guided wildflower and butterfly hikes.
