Lake Okeechobee Lock Becomes Operational as Water Levels Rise S-310 lock enables navigation between the lake and the Clewiston Canal

Clewiston, FL — With water levels in Lake Okeechobee rising, the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) today began operating the S-310 navigation lock on the lake's south shore and placed a lock tender on duty at the structure.

The District makes the S-310 lock operational at 15.5 feet NGVD and higher to provide flood protection for residents and businesses located near that part of Lake Okeechobee. While today's lake level measured 15.36 feet NGVD, wind blowing inland from the lake has increased water elevations at the lock.

With the S-310 operational, boaters must "lock through" to navigate between Lake Okeechobee and the Clewiston Canal. The lock may be returned to the open position once water levels decline.

Operating hours for the S-310 lock are currently from 5:30 a.m. to 9 p.m. Beginning October 1, the lock will be operated from 5:30 a.m. to 8 p.m.
