#### SFWMD Encourages Water Conservation

As the dry season continues, remember to follow an ethic of water conservation

WHAT:

The South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) promotes water conservation year-round to reduce the demand on freshwater sources that people, businesses and the environment depend on. The dry season, which historically lasts from November until May, is an ideal time to expand practices that minimize water use.

While last month was the driest November on record, South Florida is not currently experiencing a water shortage or drought. However, part of the region was in a drought in six of the last seven years. The dry periods are a reminder that dramatic swings in South Florida's weather are possible. A long-term commitment to water conservation helps to minimize the impact of dry times.
