SFWMD Introduces Florida Water Star<sup>SM</sup> to South Florida Program recognizes new and existing homes for water-saving measures



**West Palm Beach, FL** – As part of its ongoing efforts to encourage efficient water use, the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) has introduced the Florida Water Star<sup>SM</sup> building certification program to South Florida.

Created by the St. Johns River Water Management District and now being implemented in both South and Southwest Florida, Florida Water Star<sup>SM</sup> is a points-based recognition program that encourages water efficiency in household appliances, plumbing fixtures, irrigation systems and landscapes. The SFWMD is piloting the program in counties along its northern boundary, which border its Florida Water Star<sup>SM</sup> partners.

"Florida Water Star<sup>SM</sup> shows how we are working with our fellow water management districts to bring the best water conservation ideas and proven programs to all Floridians," said SFWMD Governing Board Vice Chairman Jerry Montgomery. "Creative thinking and cooperative spirit generates innovative solutions for water conservation and helps us protect our state's limited water resources for the long term." Conservation-minded developers, builders and homeowners who sign up for the program agree to meet water-efficiency criteria that address landscaping, irrigation and indoor features. After upgrades have been installed, a SFWMD-trained certifier verifies that the building meets all the necessary prerequisites and has achieved enough points in each of the three categories to qualify for Florida Water Star<sup>SM</sup> certification.

The number of points necessary for certification varies by tier. The Gold and Silver criteria detail water-efficient options for new single-family residential construction, with the Gold tier conserving more water. Developed in late 2009 by the South Florida and St. Johns River water management districts in conjunction with water conservation professionals, the Bronze tier recognizes owners of existing homes for taking water-saving steps, such as installing high-efficiency toilets and planting Florida-friendly vegetation.

"Development of the Bronze tier opens an already successful program to a new group of homeowners interested in conserving water while reducing their utility bills," said SFWMD Executive Director Carol Ann Wehle. "The entire Florida Water Star<sup>SM</sup> program will play a vital role in fostering a lasting water conservation ethic in South Florida."

Florida Water Star<sup>SM</sup> can be effectively integrated into building projects along with other programs, such as the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's ENERGY STAR, the Florida Green Building Coalition's green standards and the U.S. Green Building Council's LEED program. While many of these programs provide general guidelines for water efficiency, Florida Water Star<sup>SM</sup> specifically addresses uses relevant to Florida, further enhancing effectiveness of the other programs.

As part of the program, SFWMD water conservation officers are training Florida Water Star<sup>SM</sup> certifiers for all three residential tiers. The first Florida Water Star<sup>SM</sup> Residential Certifier Training in South Florida was held in October 2009 in West Palm Beach, and 16 of the trainees from that workshop subsequently passed a three-hour exam on their way to becoming official certifiers.

Another free two-day training workshop is scheduled for June 10 and 11 at the SFWMD St. Cloud Field Office. Attendees should be familiar with other green building programs or have basic knowledge of irrigation systems, landscape design and/or indoor water use.

Introduction of Florida Water Star<sup>SM</sup> to South Florida is a component of the SFWMD Comprehensive Water Conservation Program, which encourages more responsible use of water resources throughout the region. Numerous stakeholders worked with the SFWMD to define specific regulatory, voluntary and incentive-based programs and indepth education and marketing plans that will help foster a year-round conservation ethic.
