STATEMENT RE: Validation of Certificates of Participation for the River of Grass Acquisition

"The South Florida Water Management District is satisfied with today's progress toward validating its authority to issue Certificates of Participation under Florida law for Everglades restoration.

"The court's validation would provide Floridians with judicial assurance that the District's financing program and water resource projects are both in the public interest and benefit our health, safety and welfare.

"Acquiring land south of Lake Okeechobee for Everglades restoration is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity that offers immense environmental benefits. The strategic location of these thousands of acres of land provides water managers with the flexibility to store and clean water on a scale never before contemplated to protect Florida's coastal estuaries and better revive, restore and preserve America's Everglades.

"As we continue working toward this historic acquisition, the District remains mindful of its responsibilities to the taxpayers and the importance of accomplishing its existing statutory mandates and legal obligations. We remain committed to prudent fiscal decision-making as this transaction moves forward and to ensuring that any projects undertaken will provide lasting benefits to South Florida's environment and her citizens."
